

Natural Areas Management Internship

The Natural Areas Management Internship will focus on learning the tools and techniques utilized by stewards of land conservation. Our program manages over 30 Cornell owned nature preserves both on and off campus totaling over 4,000 acres. These nature preserves are biologically diverse and include representative examples of many of the ecosystems found in our region.

As an intern, you will work closely with Natural Areas staff on a variety of stewardship tasks including

- plant identification
- invasive species control
- use of GIS & GPS
- trail maintenance
- site monitoring
- rare plant monitoring and protection

A major focus of our efforts will be on the assessment of invasive species and different methods of control including

- hand pulling
- cutting
- herbicide application

The Natural Areas Management internship will provide you with invaluable experience in hands-on conservation work.

Each Monday from June to August interns will participate in Learning Mondays, a series of workshops that may include field trips or educational activities about the diverse work of a public garden.
